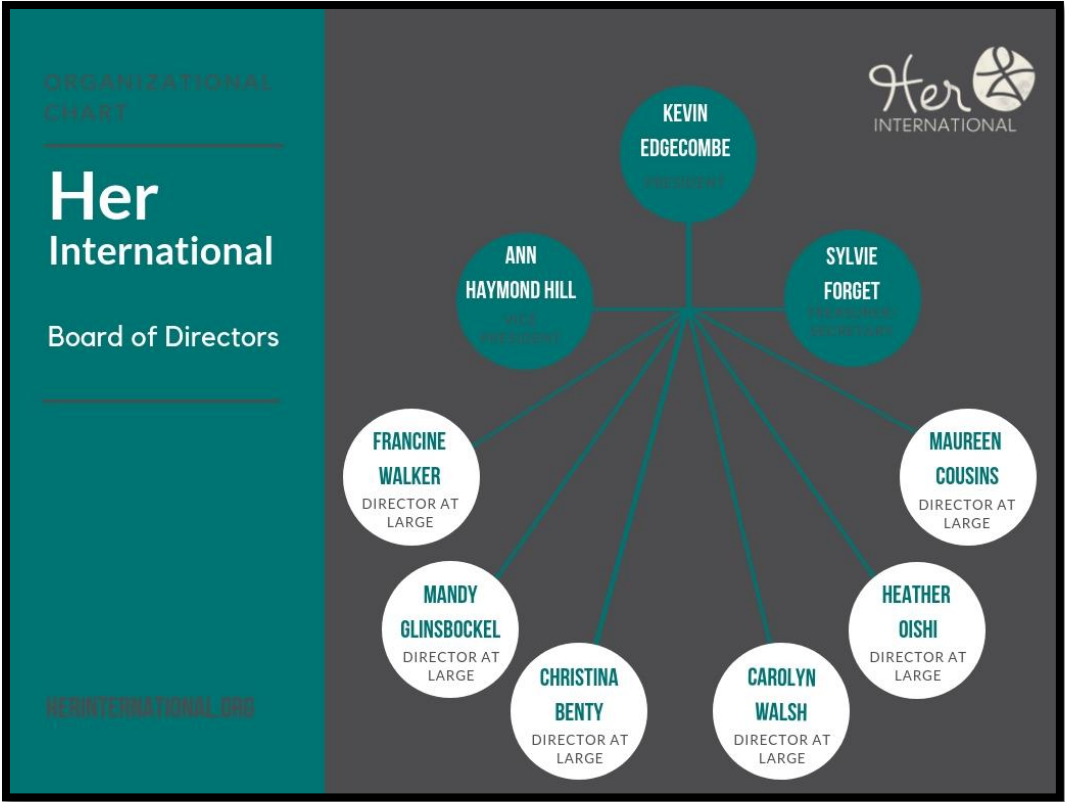

Dear board members, donors, supporters, and volunteers of Her International,

Years ago I saw John Wood speak about his philanthropic efforts (with Room to Read). He spoke of leaving his job to try to change the world. That day changed the trajectory of my life because I started thinking bigger about my own service. Could I potentially create a life dedicated to helping? Did I have it inside of me to travel to some of the most marginalized countries and use my privilege to fight for equality? I read everything I could on peaceful activists like Nelson Mandela and Gandhi and started to study International Development. One day I asked myself, "Could I use my life as my message and become a voice for the voiceless?"

As I sit here writing to you right now, I am somewhat at a loss for words. One of the richest moments of my life was when I was able to accept this role as one of the two Co-Executive Directors at Her International. This year has brought an immense amount of growth to my life in all kinds of ways, but one of the biggest being that I get to work with a team of people that care so deeply about being a voice for the voiceless. They say you are the sum of the five people you spend the most time with. I'm lucky that some of my five are my incredible colleagues and devoted Board of Directors. Another of the {easily} richest times of my life happened this year, when I had the good fortune of taking my son across the world to visit the women and children that we work with.

I get to live out my dream every single day with the work that we do and I want you to know this: not a day goes by that I am not deeply grateful for this work.

sister who lives off-grid). It came from a woman in Kelowna, who was formally an addict living on the street, and was my partner at a self-defence class. She taught me to have the courage to stand in my power and use my voice.

Her International makes no claims to having all of the answers - to giving others what they do not have. Instead, it always has and always will, strive to CONNECT people - to share with others what we have learned, and to help each of us tap into our innate strength and skills to allow us to *"dream big and reach far"*.

In case you missed the Annual General Meeting (AGM) last year, there was a motion and unanimous vote by the membership to **change the name of Inter-cultural Women's Education Network (aka "IWEN") to Her International.**

This recommendation was made to change IWEN to a name that instantly, clearly and simply states the organization's commitment to the advancement of women's empowerment around the world.

While the name changed, the organization's projects, vision, and mandate have not. Her International is still committed to helping marginalized women and girls through education and life skills opportunities. Our approach continues to work at a grassroots level - partnering with on-the-ground experts and the participants themselves to develop truly needed and effective projects. We are so excited to report that since the name change, only great things have continued. We are so proud to build on this small charity, to grow it and continue making a global impact.



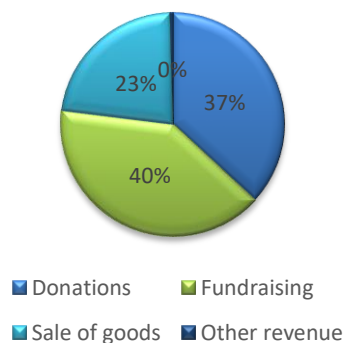


Financial Report

This year was one of big changes for Her International. Our little charity went through a name change and with this exciting news came a new logo and rebranding. This new name and look, which didn't change our mission and programs, was one of the many positive ideas our new co-executive directors Tamara McLellan and Kate Phelps brought to the board. This year's changes have impacted our cash flow and we finished the year in a deficit position and had to transfer \$46,520.97 from our reserves. However, these amazing ladies bring a new energy along with big projects to the table and we are confident that the 2018-2019 year will be one of growth.

Many events and fundraisers were held during the year to guarantee our programs keep running efficiently. In February 2018, Her International and Hope Outreach joined hands to create an outstanding evening called *Hope in Her Eyes* and split the proceeds of \$17,066.58. Kevin and Linda Edgecombe held their annual 9, Wine and Pie golf tournament in September 2017 and they generously chose to donate the proceeds to Her International with \$10,000 to Empowerment through Education (ETE), \$10,000 to the Medical Scholarship Fund and \$2,000 to general funds. Kendra McFarland initiated a Lake Dip Challenge this winter and raised \$2,000! We also had our first Christmas online auction with Kelowna Now and brought in an additional \$2,000. We had another successful year with our brick campaign that brought in \$13,900. I want to extend many thanks to everyone involved in fundraising to help improve the lives of the recipients of our programs.

2018 Income Sources



Our founder, Michelle Bonneau, saw another one of her dreams come true by writing a book which tells the story of the Tharu women. This book is filled with beautiful pictures taken by photographer Julie Gascon. These two women launched a Kickstarter Campaign with the help of our co-executive director Tamara to fund the printing of *Her, The Tharu Women's Journey to Freedom*. They raised enough money to successfully print 1000 books as well as provide funding for Her International programs.

At Christmas, we launched our *Bottles to Beads* line of jewellery. Francine Walker, one of our board members, went to Nepal earlier in the year to design earrings, bracelets and necklaces with 4 local women. While we are just in the beginning stages of promoting this line, we believe it brings a beautiful new variety to our social enterprise. We still have a high inventory of scarves and jewellery of \$38,945 and it is our priority in the next year to explore new sales avenues to reduce that inventory. We have transitioned the eastern operations to our Kelowna office, which means that our sales have decreased out East along with our online sales. However, Linda Edgecombe has done outstanding work at promoting our programs and products to audiences all around the world and continues to be a huge support to our social enterprise. Even though the social enterprise has gone through many changes, it still brought \$28,000 into Her International programs and we want to thank the many volunteers who dedicate their time at scarf sales and events year long.



With 163 girls in school, over 1000 women in our Mother's groups, 44 bikes distributed, future medical professionals and literacy and mentorship classes, each and every donation makes a difference in her life.

Programs

Empowerment through Education

"Last year went very well. All the planned activities were completed. School admission, books, stationery items, personal care items and home dress were allocated on timely manner. This certainly helped to ease the financial burden of the families and helped to motivate their children to go to school and to go ahead." The Empowerment through Education program continues to be the cornerstone of Her International's work to support the advancement of girls. The reach and impact of these scholarships are growing. This year Her International provided 182 scholarships to girls in rural Nepal bringing the total annual scholarships allocated since 2007 up to 2,261. We distributed 45 bicycles in January to students who met the financial and academic requirements, thus helping them get to school more quickly and safely. In addition to the schooling, tutoring, counseling, and peer support facilitated by Her International, our students also took part in career fairs, self-development training, women's rights rallies, and public speaking competitions.



Mother Groups



Last year was very fruitful. The women actively participated in a local election some mothers' member also stood as a candidate for the election. It was a good opportunity to the women to raise their voices and demands. They thanked us as they had been informed of their rights through their mothers' group meetings and spending time at Unako House. The literacy classes, Maghi event, women's day celebration and regular monthly meetings were the major events of the last year.

There were 833 mothers in 2015/2016 and last year and there were 952 mothers' members. We have been able to reach more women in new areas. They are continuing to understand the importance of saving and borrowing, how to operate a small business, how to fight for their rights, the

importance of the education, unity, health issues and other social subjects.



Last year 35 mothers from 2 groups were able to participate in a four month literacy program. They were taught to read Nepali, the English alphabet and basic math. By the end all women were able to write their own names and do basic math. Many went on to learn to read books and signs, use a calculator and use a phone. These women are proud that they can now teach their younger children these skills and they can continue to learn from their older children.

This year the community came together to celebrate International Women's Day. Over 1000 women marched together and celebrated with the theme "Time is Now: Rural and Urban Activist Transforming Women's Lives". They shared speeches, played games and danced. This was an empowering day for everyone.

Language is the Key

The Quebec, Canada based "Language is Key" project that launched in fall 2017 was particularly exciting for Her International because it was our first project in Canada outside of the Okanagan region. Her International recognizes that people who are victims of marginalization, poverty, lack of education and opportunity can live anywhere - not just in developing countries, but also down the street from where we live. Just as it is important for us to give a hand up to those in Nepal, it is also vital that we seek to help those in our backyard.



We were particularly excited to partner with the "Service d'Accueil des Nouveaux Arrivants" (SANA) de Trois-Rivières. SANA, is known in their community to be wholeheartedly involved and invested in their work in helping newly emigrants to Canada settle in. In their work, they shared with us at 'Her' that they observed how women who were home-bound (usually through having small children at home), did not learn the local language (French) and could quickly fade away in society. They did not make connections in the community and struggled to be involved in their children's education. In times of crisis such as illness or abuse, they did not know who to turn to or where to seek help. Unknown and unseen, they were silently lost.

"Language is Key" brought together volunteers to teach and mind children while 'Her' supplied materials and transportation. The results are that the women in the course reported not only greater capacity in reading, speaking, and writing in French, but they also reported greater self-confidence and less isolation.



Her Volunteers

“Her Volunteers” are fierce supporters who are making a difference - empowering women and girls around the world - through volunteering their time and talents. This year we held a few volunteer meet-ups in Kelowna that brought together like-minded individuals to gather and chat about the work that is being done. There were writers, photographers, videographers, and those that helped with our product lines, either by tagging or working at a sale. We could not operate without our volunteers and we are so thankful for your dedication over the years.

Her Ambassadors

In January we launched our Her Ambassadors program. **Her Ambassadors** are a group of passionate people who have committed to be ADVOCATES and ACTIVATORS for our organization. They work closely with our organization to develop their own **fundraising** initiatives, to sell Unako products, or to **raise awareness** for our cause. Ambassadors are featured on our website and awarded “Her Ambassador” badges for their websites and business cards.

Here are a few examples of what ambassadors have done this year:

9 Wine & Pie

Each September, Kevin and Linda Edgecombe, host their annual golf tournament. Once again, Her International, was chosen to be their recipient. This amazing day starts with golf and concludes with dinner and pie tasting. We are humbled every year by the generosity of the Edgecombes’ and their supporters. This year they raised over \$25,000 for Her International programs.

I Give a Dang

Check out Her Ambassador, Hugh Culver, spin his birthday on its head by choosing to give instead of get. For his 60th birthday Hugh chose to make a huge impact by launching a campaign to raise money to build classrooms in the region of Dang. Hugh has raised over \$15,000 to date. Book Launch

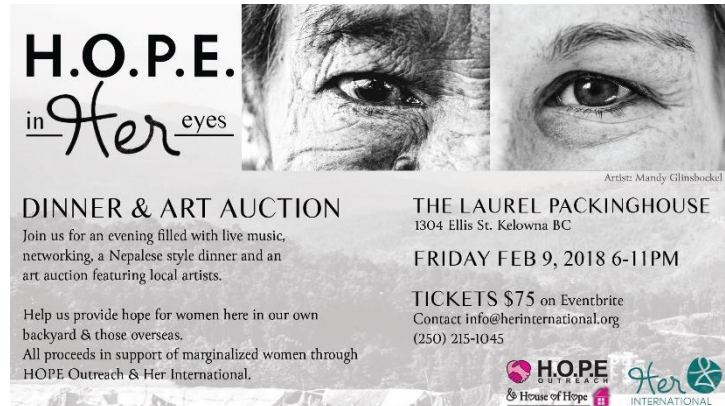

Events

HOPE IN HER EYES

Hope in Her Eyes On Feb. 9th, 2018, Her International partnered with H.O.P.E. Outreach and the House of HOPE to bring Kelowna an evening to support women locally and globally. This event sold out with over 225 people. The night included an art gallery which showcased over 20 pieces by local artists that depicted women as the subject. We decorated an area to allow for people to sit down and try eye-gazing, an exercise that shifted perspectives from the inside out. There was a Nepali style dinner and powerful speeches made by women who HOPE Outreach has helped, as well as videos depicting the courageous stories of women we work with in Nepal. The night raised over \$17,000 for women worldwide.



IWD #HERTIMETOTHRIVE

For International Women's Day on March 8th, Her International coordinated a series of local and global empowerment pop ups. Pop up events were held in 6 countries and had over 1300 attendees.

The worldwide events created good exposure for Her International locally and globally. The events linked followers to a successful campaign to raise \$10,000 for 30 girls to attend school. We secured new donors, volunteers, and supporters.

CHRISTMAS SEASON

Over the Christmas season, we began to offer a few Christmas "gifts" that one could purchase and were fortunate to have had \$1100 in sales of bricks, shoes, backpacks and hygiene products for the girls in Nepal. We will do much of the same this year, as the holiday season is a lovely time of year to give a mindful and meaningful gift.

From December 10th to December 21st, we had the Twelve Days of Giving and announced new and exciting packages every day to be bid on. The online auction with KelownaNow raised over \$2500 and attracted a lot of media attention for the charity. Thank you to KelownaNow for your partnership in this process. We will run the Festive auction again this year, so stay tuned.



Social Enterprise

The Unako scarf line was artisan redesigned this year and offers modern prints and cuts. Our social enterprise welcome a new jewellery line launched this year that features eco-chic earrings, bracelets, and necklaces. The jewellery is handmade by women in rural Nepal by grinding up discarded glass bottles and firing the glass in mud ovens and the result is that each bead is unique and looks like burnished sea glass. The jewellery is for sale at artisan fairs, online at Unako.ca, and popup events around North America.

It is our greatest hope to expand the work that we do so that we can reach more women and girls. We are in a continuous process of ensuring that our programs are highly effective, that they involve community participants in the planning process, and that they allow the recipients to also give something back to our organization, resulting in a reciprocal learning.

Financial Report

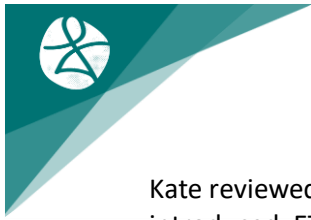
Presentation made by Sylvie Forget, Treasurer
